

As our Lenten journey brings us nearer to Jerusalem, this week's readings promise us the hope of forgiveness and eternal life as we try to stay alongside Jesus in his suffering. In the Gospel, Jesus describes the grain of wheat that dies and is buried before it bears fruit. In the same way, Jesus himself will die and rise again, drawing all of us to him. Like Jesus, we, too, are made for eternal life, and are united with him as we serve him. This week, let us ask the Lord for strength as we try to follow him in love and obedience. We pray that he will keep us safely by his side even when our own path leads us to share in his suffering. Jesus rises above his troubled heart and shows that the way to peace and fulfilment lies not in avoiding the cost, but rather in following God's will. This is the way of love and all who would follow Jesus must walk this path, by so doing they participate in God's ultimate victory over evil.

Lord, we stand at the beginning of a new week. As you journeyed on trusting in your Father's love, so let us also go on in faith and hope into the days ahead with all their joys and sorrows. Guide us on our way with your Spirit's presence within us. Amen

**THE ANNUNCIATION OF THE LORD . . .** The feast of the Annunciation, now recognized as a solemnity, was first celebrated in the fourth or fifth century. Its central focus is the Incarnation: God has become one of us. From all eternity God had decided that the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity should become human. When Mary agreed to the Angel's request to be the Mother of God, she did not know what the future might hold. She had to repeat that 'Yes' daily, even to standing beneath the cross of Calvary. None of us can see into the future, we need the guidance and strength of the Holy Spirit. Mary's strength and humility can be ours if we listen to the will of God and follow it as she did.

Almighty Father, You have revealed the beauty of Your power by exalting the lowly virgin of Nazareth and making her the mother of our Saviour. May the prayers of Mary bring Jesus to the waiting world and fill the void of incompletion with the presence of the Child. Amen.

Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales . . . The following is taken from correspondence from Cardinal Vincent Nichols. "We welcome the designation of Tuesday 23<sup>rd</sup> March as a National Day of Reflection to mark the anniversary of the first national lockdown with a minutes silence at midday and doorstep vigils of light at 8pm. We ask you all to make this not only a Day of Reflection but also a Day of Prayer. In reflection we ponder on all that has taken place; in prayer we bring this to our Heavenly Father . . . We reflect in sorrow on all those who have died, whether family members, friends or those unknown to us personally. We pray for them, asking our Father to welcome them into their heavenly home, the destiny for which God first gave us the gift of life. We reflect with compassion on all those who have suffered during this last year, whether through illness, stress, financial disaster or family tensions . . . May Tuesday 23<sup>rd</sup> March be a great day of prayer that this pandemic comes to an end and that the gift of God's Holy Spirit will carry us all forward to a new and better life, both here and in the world to come."



**The Stations of the Cross** are a powerful way to contemplate, and enter into, the mystery of Jesus' gift of himself to us. When we pray the Stations of the Cross we are tracing the footsteps of Christ, in his journey from being condemned to death to his resurrection. In knowing that our Lord and Saviour died for us, meditating on the Stations of the Cross becomes an experience where we can unite with Christ.

We adore you, O Lord, and we praise You, because by Your Holy Cross, You have redeemed the world.



## Thirteenth Station ~ Jesus is Taken Down from the Cross

Mary takes the broken body of her son in her arms. In her grief she remembers the words he spoke over the bread, "This is my body, broken for you." She remembers that little baby in Bethlehem worshipped by shepherds and kings. She remembers the days when the crowds followed him and she is full of sorrow.

Help us Lord to accept the partings that must come. Help us to offer our loved ones back to you as Mary offered her son. Faced with the silence of death, let us not despair but find hope. Help us to trust in you, the Lord of the living and the dead.

### Fourteenth Station ~ Jesus is Laid in The Tomb

They take the body of Jesus to its resting place. All those who had loved him felt emptied and exhausted. There seemed no longer any sense or purpose in anything, but at least no more harm could come to him. They closed the tomb and left. In this final act of surrender who would have imaged this tomb would soon be empty or that Jesus would show himself alive to his disciples.



Jesus, each day you put before us life or death. Help us always to choose life. We pray for all those we have known who have died, and for those who have no one to pray for them. May we have eyes to see the promise of new life that the darkness can hold.

I love you, Lord Jesus, my love above all things. I repent with my whole heart for having offended you. Never permit me to separate myself from you again. Grant that I may love You always and then do with me what you will. Amen.
