Reflection: 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time

John's recounting of the multiplication of the loaves is, as always, a symbol of the Eucharist. From these few loaves many were fed and made into a community of people who believed in Jesus, at least for a while anyway. We are all faced with problems of individualism, relativism, in own parishes and we have to balance individual, with larger needs. It would be scandalous if we were so concerned with our own problems that we forget the larger world and its needs. The apostles could have stayed in Jerusalem and looked no further than their own little world. Alternatively, we can be so preoccupied with other people's lives we fail to see the problems closer to home. Everyone must strike that right balance. The celebration of the Eucharist, symbolised in the Gospel, reminds us that there is in fact a balance to be struck between our own personal world and the world of mankind.

I think part of the problem is that our culture of individualism and relativism leads to this separation; contrary to this, the Eucharist is unity. Our Triune God is unity, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, three persons in one.

The Eucharist reminds us that we are connected to something beyond our self; we are all part of the larger Body of Christ.

Distribution of Holy Communion will now take place during the Mass and you will be able to return to your seat to make your thanksgiving and receive the final blessing before the marshals direct you out of the building.

News from Uganda: Fr. Vincent meets families who go without food for a full day and it is the little children who suffer most. Using money from our Uganda Mission Fund he recently bought 300 kilos of beans and 1,430 kilos of maize flour to share with hungry families. One day he helped 16 families with food. Fr. Vincent says "All was possible because of your generosity. The families send their gratitude. Thanks for lightening our burden." Please pray for Fr. Vincent and his people.

Ongoing Faith Witness Against Hassockfield: In October, the Home Office plans to open an Immigration Removal Centre at Hassockfield on the site of the former Medomsley Detention Centre. This will be for 80 women seeking asylum in the UK. The proposal is inhumane, unjust and incompatible with our faith which calls us to recognise the intrinsic dignity of each person. These women are people like ourselves who have the right to a place of safety and to be treated with respect and compassion. A monthly prayer vigil will be held at the barrier to Hassockfield on the first Sunday of each month at 3pm starting on Sunday 1st August. This will last for about 30 minutes and will incorporate a time of silent witness. Please support this with your prayer and, if at all possible, come along. First Reading

2 Kings 4:42-44

A man came from Baal-shalishah, bringing Elisha, the man of God, bread from the first-fruits, twenty barley loaves and fresh grain in the ear.' 'Give it to the people to eat', Elisha said. But his servant replied, 'How can I serve this to a hundred men?' 'Give it to the people to eat' he insisted 'for the Lord says this, "They will eat and have some left over."' He served them; they ate and had some left over, as the Lord had said.

Psalm:

144(145):10-11,15-18

You open wide your hand, O Lord, and grant our desires.

Second Reading

Ephesians 4:1-6

I, the prisoner in the Lord, implore you to lead a life worthy of your vocation. Bear with one another charitably, in complete selflessness, gentleness and patience. Do all you can to preserve the unity of the Spirit by the peace that binds you together. There is one Body, one Spirit, just as you were all called into one and the same hope when you were called. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God who is Father of all, over all, through all and within all.

Gospel John 6:

Jesus went off to the other side of the Sea of Galilee – or of Tiberias – and a large crowd followed him, impressed by the signs he gave by curing the sick. Jesus climbed the hillside, and sat down there with his disciples. It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover.

Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, 'Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?' He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks, and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world.' Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself.

Spiritual Communion Prayer - My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as already being there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.
