Reflection 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B

As I settle down to write this reflection, with the sound of my typing pretty much drowned out by the rain lashing down outside and overwhelming my gutters, all I can think about is petrol.

I've never really given much thought to petrol before - it's just something that is there and which I put into the car every now and again to make it go and take me places.

This last week though, two separate things have made me think about petrol probably more than I have ever done since I passed my driving test some forty years ago.

The first was that the formulation of petrol has changed as of this month. We are now being encouraged to buy what is known as E10 petrol, which is said to be kinder to the environment than the petrol it replaces. You can also buy a petrol called E5, but you need to check which is best for your car.

I filled up at a well-known supermarket the other day, but didn't realise these changes had already been made. Once I realised, I was utterly convinced I had put in the wrong petrol and had damaged my car beyond repair - but I hadn't. Panic over.

But the panic returned when I saw on the news that there is a national petrol shortage. People are 'panic buying' and supplies are running dry, so then I began to worry about what would happen when the petrol I have runs out, which it will very soon. Will I be stranded at home forever? Maybe I should fill up again now.

But having just seen a sparrow land on my patio table, shake itself dry and fly off into the refuge of my hedge I am reminded that God is watching over me.

I don't really need to worry about petrol, or how I am going to get about.

There are many other things that I should be worrying about - like have I helped anyone today? Have I made someone happy? Have I been a good witness to my Faith?

I'll have a think whilst the rain continues to fall. I can fill up the car with petrol some other time.

Covid: UPDATE

We have received updated guidance from Bishop Robert regarding our Diocese Covid procedures following the recent meeting of the Bishop's Council. As you are aware, legal restrictions were lifted in July, however local infection rates and hospital admissions are now increasing and health officials in the region are advising that maintaining Covid control measures such as face covering, and social distancing throughout the coming autumn/winter period will be vital to controlling infections. It is still down to all of us to keep each other safe by reducing the potential spread of infections.

Some controls are being relaxed, but a number of measures will continue for the present time so that our churches remain safe places to attend Mass.

- ✓ You will still be asked to sanitise your hands as you enter and leave church
- It is recommended that you continue to wear a face mask in church, unless you are exempt
- Churches will continue to be cleaned between Masses and other services
- Please try to keep 1m distance from those not in your household or 'bubble'
- The one-way system in church will continue
- Ministers, servers and readers can return to their normal duties
- We will no longer be taking contact details for test and trace

Our marshals have a very important role to play in keeping us safe. Please follow their guidance and co-operate with them as they do their job to seat people making best use of all the available space in church.

The obligation to attend weekend Mass remains suspended for the present time.

Twenty Seventh Sunday - Year B - 3rd October 2021

First Reading

Genesis 2:18-24

The Lord God said, 'It is not good that the man should be alone. I will make him a helpmate.' So from the soil the Lord God fashioned all the wild beasts and all the birds of heaven. These he brought to the man to see what he would call them; each one was to bear the name the man would give it. The man gave names to all the cattle, all the birds of heaven and all the wild beasts. But no helpmate suitable for man was found for him. So the Lord God made the man fall into a deep sleep. And while he slept, he took one of his ribs and enclosed it in flesh. The Lord God built the rib he had taken from the man into a woman, and brought her to the man. The man exclaimed: 'This at last is bone from my bones, and flesh from my flesh! This is to be called woman, for this was taken from man.' This is why a man leaves his father and mother and joins himself to his wife, and they become one body.

May the Lord bless us all the days of our life.

O blessed are those who fear the Lord and walk in his ways! By the labour of your hands you shall

Second Reading

Hebrews 2:9-11

We see in Jesus one who was for a short while made lower than the angels and is now crowned with glory and splendour because he submitted to death; by God's grace he had to experience death for all mankind. As it was his purpose to bring a great many of his sons into glory, it was appropriate that God, for whom everything exists and through whom everything exists, should make perfect, through suffering, the leader who would take them to their salvation. For the one who sanctifies, and the ones who are sanctified, are of the same stock; that is why he openly calls them brothers.

Gospel Mark 10:2-16

Some Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, 'Is it against the law for a man to divorce his wife?' They were testing him. He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?' 'Moses allowed us' they said 'to draw up a writ of dismissal and so to divorce.' Then Jesus said to them, 'It was because you were so unteachable that he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide.' Back in the house the disciples questioned him again about this, and he said to them, 'The man who divorces his wife and marries another is quilty of adultery against her. And if a woman divorces her husband and marries another she is guilty of adultery too.'

People were bringing little children to him, for him to touch them. The disciples turned them away, but when Jesus saw this he was indignant and said to them, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. I tell you solemnly, anyone who does not welcome the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.' Then he put his arms round them, laid his hands on them and gave them his blessing.

Spiritual Communion Prayer - My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as already being there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.
